What you will need for shortbread:

- 125g unsalted butter, softened
- 55g caster sugar, plus extra to finish
- 180g Plain flour
- Green fondant icing



## Four leaf Clover biscuits

To make your biscuits:

1. To start with you need to pre heat your oven to 190c/170c fan/Gas 5
2. Next you need to beat the butter and your sugar together until smooth
3. Once you have done this you need to stir in the flour until you have a smooth looking paste mixture, you then need to take out your paste and roll it out, so you have a 1cm thick dough.
4. Cut the dough into round circles or if you have a cutter, you can use this
5. When you have placed your round onto a baking sheet you can bake in the oven for 15-20 mins or until they are a pale golden brown. Let them cool on a wire rack.
6. Once they have cooled you can use some green fondant icing to cut out four leaf clover shapes and add to your biscuits.

## It's Not Easy Being Green



### Supplies Needed:

- As many green items of clothing as you can find
- One bucket per team

### Prep:

Find as many green items of clothing as you can and put them in a bucket for each team.

### How to Play:

Have players stand on one side of the room and place the bucket of clothes on the other side of the room.

Players must either hop like a frog, or if you want to use two players, must play leap frog from their side of the room to the bucket on the other side. When they reach the bucket, they must put on one item of clothing and hop back.

The first player to successfully go back and forth five times, putting on an additional green item each time, wins. Or you can just say whoever puts on the most items in the minute wins.

What you will need:

- Paper
- Paint in rainbow colour/if not paint you can use coloured pens
- Cotton wool for the cloud
- Glue



## Rainbow and pot of gold craft



To start with you want to grab a blank piece of paper, from there you will need to use a pencil to draw a pot of gold one side of your page and then draw out the shape of your rainbow coming out of the pot towards the other side of your page. Once you have done this you can colour in your pot back and then add your golden nuggets in the pot you can use sparkly paper, or you can draw it in yourself using some pens. Next you want to complete your rainbow you can either use coloured paints and each colour use dots to fill in the rainbow or, do the same idea with your coloured pens. The final step of your rainbow is to create some clouds using cotton wool on the other end of your rainbow, all you will need is some glue and use cotton wool pulled apart to create fluffy clouds. Once you have done this you have created your own rainbow pot of gold.

## St Patrick's Day Facts

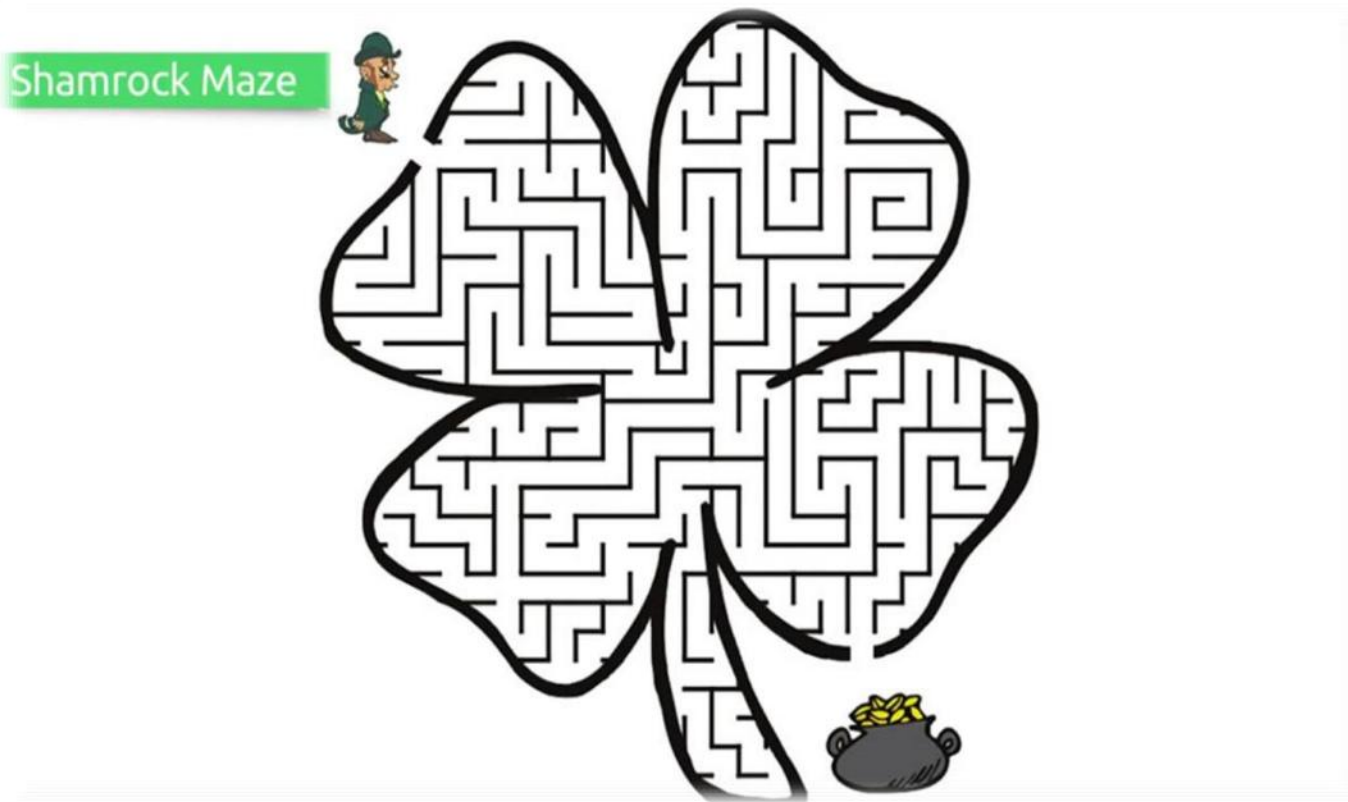
Here's our list of 10 very interesting facts about saint Patrick and celebrating March 14th. They're pretty surprising! especially Fact 3!



- 1 St. Patrick's Day is an annual feast day celebration of Ireland. It is traditionally a religious celebration on March 17th.
- 2 It is believed that Saint Patrick drove all the snakes out of Ireland, but snakes have never been native to Ireland!
- 3 Saint Patrick was not Irish! He was from Wales. He is remembered for bringing Christianity to Ireland.
- 4 The shamrock is Ireland's national flower. It is one of the main symbols of Saint Patrick's Day. The shamrock represents the Holy Trinity.
- 5 The leprechaun is an unfriendly Irish fairy. If you catch one, they are forced to tell you where their pot of gold is!
- 6 Most people, even non-Irish, wear green on this day. An Irish tradition is to pinch anyone who is not wearing green!
- 7 Blue was the colour associated with St. Patrick. In 1798 the colour green became officially associated with the day.
- 8 Corned beef, cabbage and green beer are traditional fare. Less traditional are party foods that are dyed green.
- 9 Since 1962, the Chicago River is dyed green to celebrate St. Patrick's Day.
- 10 St. Patrick's Day is now celebrated all around the world. Anyone can join in the celebrations!
