



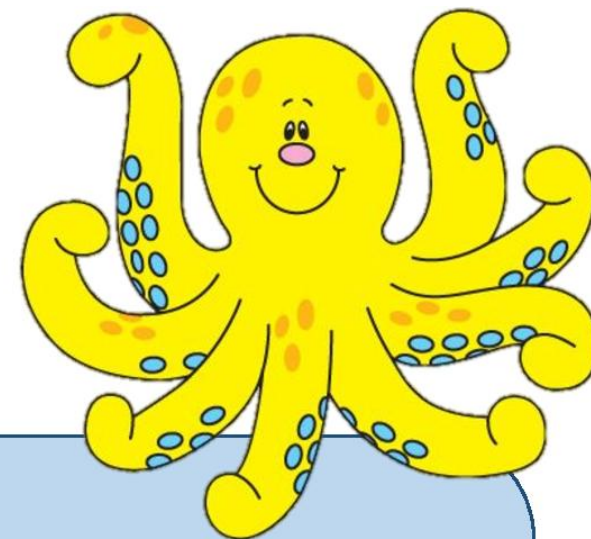

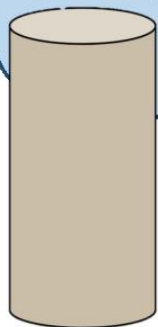

What you will need:
-Toilet roll tube
-Colouring pens or paint
-Scissors



Make your own toilet roll octopus

To start with you want to find yourself an empty toilet roll tube, then using some scissors you want to cut about a quarter of the way up your toilet roll tube all the way around ensure you are leaving about a 1-2 cm gap in between each cut. Once you have done this you need to bend each of the flap's outwards these will create the legs of the octopus. Then its time to decorate your octopus you can pick any colour you like to make your octopus paint or colour the whole tube and leave to dry. Then its time to add the details you need to colour some circles on the legs to make the suckers and you also need to draw a face on your octopus at the front. Once you have done this you will have created your very own toilet roll tube octopus

10 YEARS

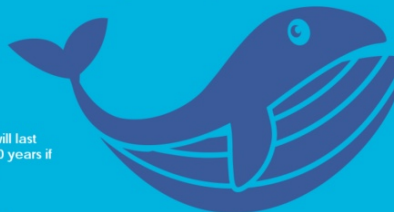
We have produced more plastic in the last 10 years than we did in the whole of the last century (timsilverwood.com)



Plastic bags are used for an average of 12 minutes, but a single plastic bag has a life expectancy of up to 1,000 years (plasticoceans.net)



A plastic bottle will last for more than 450 years if left on a beach (sas.org.uk)



Over 100,000 marine mammals and 1 million seabirds die every year from ingestion or entanglement in plastic litter (theoceancleanup.com)

Less than 5% of plastics are recycled worldwide. Currently, only 3% per cent of plastic bags used in Australia are recycled (cleanup.org.au)

Worldwide, as many as one trillion plastic bags are used each year – or more than one million bags every minute. All these bags equate to around 100 million barrels of oil. (plasticoceans.net)



Plastic has remained the most common category of rubbish picked up on Clean Up Australia day over the last 20 years (cleanup.org.au)



8.7 plastic checkout bags contain enough embodied petroleum energy to drive a car 1 kilometre (cleanup.org.au)
